

# Introduction to the Arabic Alphabet: Pronouncing Arabic Consonants

**Lesson Duration:** 1 50-minute class period

**Objective:** Students will be able to pronounce each consonant of the Arabic alphabet.

#### **Materials:**

- Intro to Arabic Presentation
- Notecards (28 per student) or graphic organizer
- Colored markers or colored pencils
- LCD projector and computer
- Internet connection

#### **Procedure:**

1. Do Now (optional)

List at least one difference between the Arabic and English alphabet.

## 2. Arabic Alphabet Song

Play once as an introduction (video is also embedded in the presentation) Revisit possibly at the end of the lesson

#### 3. Arabic Consonants Presentation

- Each slide will represent one consonant of the Arabic alphabet, including the transliteration and tips to help with pronunciation
- During the presentation have students complete a flashcard for each letter or complete the fillin graphic organizer.
  - Each flashcard will have 2 sides: side 1 will include the Arabic letter, and side 2 will include the pronunciation
    - Arabic letter will be in color A
    - Sound will be in color B
    - Hints/examples will be in color C

- 4. Review each letter with the students
  - o Have students refer to their flashcards during the review
- 5. Replay alphabet song (optional)
- 6. Exit Ticket (optional)

In complete sentences describe the similarities you found between the English and Arabic alphabets.

For ELLs: In complete sentences describe the similarities you found between the Arabic alphabet and your native alphabet.

## **Modifications:**

- Partner up students in order to work together creating their own phonetic tips for each letter
- Let students use a Arabic alphabet resource sheet

## **Assessments:**

- Informally assess students while reviewing the letter during step 4 in the procedures.
- Use the exit ticket as a formative assessment
