## Morocco: Storytelling, a window into the culture

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LESSON OVERVIEW	This lesson is meant as a basic introduction to storytelling and Moroccan culture. It is designed to take 4 - 45 minute class periods and could be condensed or expanded to suit your needs. This unit is designed to be taught in French for novice-high, or intermediate —low/mid students.

DAY 1 : Introduction to Morocco	<ol> <li>Ask students: Où se trouve le Maroc? Sur quel continent?         Comment est sa géographie: la côte Atlantique et Méditerranée, le Sahara, les Atlas (Identify these on a map)</li> <li>Make a class list of students' ideas of Morocco. Use the questions below to facilitate the discussion. List their answers on the board.         <ol> <li>A quoi penses-tu quand tu penses au Maroc?</li> <li>Qu'est-ce qu'on mange au Maroc? Où vit-on? Dans quelles sortes édifices?</li> </ol> </li> <li>Use Powerpoint (below) to introduce Morocco to students.</li> <li>Confirm or reject our stereotypes as we study Morocco.</li> </ol>

DAY 2 : Storytelling, Le	Students learn about storytelling and listen to a Moroccan story.
bout de corde	<ol> <li>Introduce the role of storytellers in Moroccan society.         <ol> <li>Resource: New York Times article: Keeping a Moroccan Tradition Alive, One Tale at a Time.</li> <li>Feb. 27, 2006.</li></ol></li></ol>

DAY 3 : Ilustrate story	Students illustrate the story.  Now that students are familiar with the story, have them:  1. Identify the main events of the story on paper  2. Illustrate the main events of the story
Day 4 : Record written version	Students record the story as text  1. Using the illustrations and their memories, students record the story in written form. (By going from listening, to creating pictures, to producing a written version, we will avoid this becoming a simple dictée and students will have the experience/sense of preserving an oral "text.")  2. Students will share their stories in groups or pairs, listing similarities and differences. Though we all heard the same story, our recorded versions will be slightly different.
ASSESSMENT	<ul> <li>The assessment for this unit is oral. The questions are provided below.</li> <li>1. Résumez les évènements les plus importants du conte <i>Le bout de corde</i> en 1-2 minutes.</li> <li>2. Où se trouve le Maroc?</li> <li>3. Nommez deux régions géographiques du pays.</li> </ul>

IDEAS FOR EXPANSION	<ul> <li>Have students write and record their own story, one they make up or one that they were told as a child.</li> <li>For more advanced language learners: have students each read/listen to a different Moroccan story. In small groups, students take turns playing the role of the storyteller and sharing their story with their group.</li> </ul>
